The most important components of a citation are the **author(s)**, **book** or **journal title**, **article title**, **date**, **publication location** and **publisher**, **volume** and **issue number**, **page number**, **url** or **doi**, and **access date**. Section and page numbers corresponding to each citation are included for the reader's reference.

If the document being cited is missing a piece of information, skip that portion of the citation and move on the next page.
